
January Meeting Program

The new year is upon us, and with it bring many new things. New members, new opportunities to hunt new places, and of course the new detectors we might all consider purchasing. AMDC was fortunate to have Tom Ashworth on hand to talk about one of his favorite detectors, the XP Deus II.



Tom also uses his detector underwater, a lot! It is rated down to 66 feet, more than adequate for most lost treasures near shorelines. The whole thing can break down in moments to fit neatly

Tom showed how this detector is similar and vastly different than most detectors we know about. Firstly is the weight, the detector's weight can start at just 1.5 pounds, similar detectors are double that. Another thing that makes this detector unique is the 'brains' of the detector are in the coil housing rather than a control box. That alone makes this next feature really fascinating. You can forego the control box altogether and have it wirelessly transmit the signals and data to a wristwatch like device! Like most detectors, you can accessorize to your hearts content with headsets, pinpointers and such and what's neat about that is you can have them all link together. No more taking the headphones off to listen to the pinpointer, it transmits right to it!



inside a backpack for easy carrying to where you want to hunt. So you want to buy one or two? Go for it, just know these are not your hardware store cheap-o detectors. These things are made in France and cost quite a pretty franc. You can easily drop \$1500 for a set up, but Tom says, not to worry, this is a detector you



AMDC Search Team Results

The Austin Metal Detecting Club has a team of searchers that go out and attempt to find lost items. These are the results of our recent searches.

The Story: Hi there. I was at a group function today at Festival Beach, and my titanium wedding band fell off my finger. I know a small area in which it happened, and we made a

group effort to find it, with no luck. If titanium rings are able to be found with detectors I would greatly appreciate the help.

The Search: Mitch and Scott were dispatched to the scene. The standard protocol for searching at a city park in Austin is to have the person who lost the item contact the city to ask for a permit to search. Once the item is found any and all searching must cease. So we told Eric to apply for the permit. We then met up with him at the location and we went through the pleasant-ries and he told us the city told him that a permit was not need-ed so long as the person who lost the item is on site while the

search is happening See below). Whether this gave our searchers a little extra spring in their step, they set to searching with a couple of detectors plus one more for Eric. About 30 minutes or so, Scott picked up a signal. The ring was found flattened in the ground among leaves of a very similar color making finding it by just looking very improbable.

What advice would you give to someone new in the hobby?


I would suggest joining AMDC and make friends with our awesome members. Find a hunting buddy, learn the do's and don't of the sport and ENJOY!
