Fools Gold?

In 2015, George Powell and Layton Davies uncovered 300 coins and gold jewellery in a field in Eye, near Leominster, Herefordshire.



Instead of declaring the treasure, as required by law, they sold the valuables to dealers. In 2019, they were both found guilty of theft, conspiring to conceal criminal property, and converting criminal property by selling it.

George Powell was sentenced to 10 years in prison, later reduced to six and a half years on appeal. Layton Davies was sentenced to eight and a half years in prison, later reduced to five years on appeal.


At the time of the trial, just 31 of the estimated 300 coins that they found had been recovered.

January Meeting

Mitch London presented a program on Artificial Intelligence and how it could relate to metal detecting. In creating the program one might say he spent hours researching the topic and narrowing it down to the best bits of information to be included in the program. One could say that, but they would be wrong.

The entire program in fact was generated by AI. Mitch went to one of the AI websites and simply asked it to create a list of talking points with the subject of "How Can AI Work Together with Metal Detecting?". Seconds later a list was pre-

sented and he simply copied the information.

The program stated that with the use of AI, metal detectors of the future might be able to better interpret the signals and differentiate between trash and treasure. It might even be able to give a rough picture of what the target might be and a more precise location as to how deep you will have to dig.

It is hard to say what exactly AI will do in the future if anything. But in 10 years time, we may be looking back saying, "How did we ever do without AI detectors?".

Metal-detecting Enthusiasts Help Locate Lost Mementos

Losing a valuable item, such as a sentimental piece of jewelry, could be devastating for some but now there's a group who will help you track it down, for free!

The beeping of a metal detector is music to the ears of Lee Houser, a member of NEPA Ring Rescue.

"There are so many treasures out there, waiting to be found. People don't understand things from the past, stuff that probably they've never seen before."

Houser, along with Brian Condel and Kevin Klatt, make up the trio of metal-detecting enthusiasts.

Using their hobby, they now help people who have lost hope to find their lost valuables at no cost.



"The best part is seeing the person's face when you bring that object to them that they'd lost and they thought they'd never see again," says Condel.

Starting the group just three weeks ago, they already helped a woman in Jefferson Township.

"(She) and her husband got into an argument and threw the ring. She got out of the car and threw the ring into the field next to the house. Took us about two hours, but yeah we found it and reunited it with her," says Houser.

But the magic behind the machine? "There's a coil at the bottom of it and it sends out an electromagnetic signal into the ground. Whatever metals in the ground, whether it's ferrous which is iron or non-ferrous which is silver or brass, it changes that signal and the coil picks up that change and then it converts it into a sound."

The group shares more than 50 years of detecting experience. Now this hobby requires a lot of patience, but also research when it comes to finding historical items such as a Civil War-era U.S. Belt buckle. "I found that several years ago up on the gravity railroad on Moosic Mountain," Klatt says.

"I had a great, great grandfather that served in the 143rd Pennsylvania infantry, so the Civil War items you know have a special place."

The group already has more than a dozen people across the area asking for help. Missions that excite the trio all to bring joy to others.

"We just do it as a hobby. We love doing it and love helping people."

When asked what their best find was, they all agreed it was their wives for letting them dedicate so much time to the hobby.


